Jack's Corner

We have had such a beneficial amount of rain this spring, which has produced a large amount of nitrogen that we don't get with irrigation systems. In fact, you may want to consider buying or building your own rain barrel to salvage water for your plants.

Gardeners still have time to plant annuals for spring and summer. Plant hot weather-loving annuals such as zinnias, marigolds, celosia, salvia, lantana and verbena, just to name a few.

If planting tomatoes, do so now and keep them on a regular watering and fertilization schedule for a bountiful harvest throughout the summer. You may also consider planting herbs either in the garden or in a container on the deck or patio. Fresh herbs just seem to add great flavor to home-cooked meals.

This is the perfect time to plant long-blooming perennials like daylilies, hosta, coneflower, balloon flower, homestead verbena, gladiolas, peonies and clematis. Go tropical and plant alamanda, mandevilla or bougainvillea for some bright colors around your mailbox or on a trellis. A hibiscus makes a great potted plant with bright color as well.

Fertilize azaleas, camellias and roses now to encourage a second bloom; then continue to feed them on schedule throughout June. Mulch all garden beds well to help regulate soil temperature, retain moisture and keep weeds at bay. Use at least four inches of mulch but be sure not to use any more than this so as not to interfere with moisture reaching the root system.

Apply a watering schedule that will give your lawn one inch of water per week. This can be done by placing a container in the lawn and measuring how much water you are disbursing at any one time. Set your sprinkler timer to give the appropriate amount of wetness and water early in the morning to prevent evaporation. This also allows the water to reach the root system to promote a healthier lawn. Never water late in the evening as this will promote fungus and disease. (If your Bermuda or zoysia grass has any bare spots, you may re-seed mid-month.)

To help eliminate weeds in your lawn, use a weed killer, not grass killer, which will help kill the weeds without harming the lawn. Good products to use are "Weed- B- Gone," "Weed-Free Zone," and "Image." Apply to lawns at 70 degrees and above.

Be sure to keep bird feeders and bird baths full as new families of our feathered friends are returning. If you like watching hummingbirds, try planting Miss Huff lantana or red salvia under their feeders for an extra treat. Be sure to change the water in your bird bath every three days to prevent mosquito larva from hatching.

Shield yourself from the sun's harmful rays by wearing plenty of sunscreen and a wide brimmed hat while you are playing in the dirt.

May 14th is Mother's Day so be sure to treat yours to something special on this date. I would also like to wish all WindStone moms a very Happy Mother's Day!
