Jack's Corner

October 2017

Fall is a wonderful time for planting just about anything you desire. From trees to shrubs, perennials, spring blooming bulbs and of course fall annuals. Whether in the garden or in pots nothing says "Fall" better than Snapdragons, Chrysanthemums, Violas and Pansies. For foliage color try Ornamental Mustard, Kale or Cabbage. Don't forget the Pumpkins for fall and Halloween.

It's also a great time to plant spring flowering bulbs such as Daffodils, Hyacinths and Tulips. Be sure to use a fertilizer such as bone meal or bulb food. Whatever you decide to plant be sure to water to help establish a healthy root system.

If your perennials, such as Hosta, Daylilies, Daisies and Cone flowers, are looking a little overgrown consider dividing them and sharing with your family and neighbors. This will give your plants that needed breathing room for next year's blooms. Try adding vines and ground covers to your garden such as Clematis, Mondo Grass, Variegated Liriope and English Ivy. Adding trees to your landscape will provide shade that can reduce summer energy costs and increase your home's value.

This is a great time to amend the soil in your garden. Improve the soil by adding organic material such as Natures Helper or a rich top soil. Use a tiller or a good garden rake to blend in the new material with your existing soil.

If you have some of those special plants, such as tropical flowers like Hibiscus and Mandevilla that you would like to keep from year to year, now is the time to bring them inside. Before you bring the plants inside, whether it be in a sunroom or the garage, check for insects. You may want to use an insecticidal soap or a Systemic insecticide prior to the big move. We have Geraniums, Hibiscus, Mandevilla, Begonias and several Ferns that we have kept for many years.

If you need to reseed your Fescue lawn, now is a great time to do so. Seeding in the fall allows the grass to establish a root system over the winter and become very healthy before the stressful heat of summer returns.

To control winter weeds such as Poa Annua (Annual Bluegrass), Henbit, Chickweed and others apply a pre-emergent to your Bermuda or Zoysia lawns. Do not apply to Fescue lawns if you plan to seed in the fall. Doing so will prevent both the weed seed and grass seed from germinating.

Whether you are planting something new, or maintaining older plants and trees, be sure to keep them well watered. Normally October is a dry month, so keep your plants watered, especially before the first frost. Dry soil in cold weather can cause serious damage that you won't discover until next spring.

When frost threatens immediately pick the remaining tomatoes still on the vine. Some will be green giving you the choice of enjoying fried green tomatoes, or you can store and ripen them indoors. Wash and dry the fruit completely. Set the tomatoes in a box not touching each other. Store in a dark room at about 60 degrees. Add an apple or banana to the box. These fruit release ethylene gas, which will speed up the tomato ripening process.

Keep your bird feeders full this month as we transition from summer to fall. Many birds start to migrate and you might be surprised at who comes to visit. Keep your Humming Bird feeders full, as they may attract migrating Hummers as well.

FALL TO-DO LIST

Step on crunchy leaves

- Clean downspouts and gutters
- Dust ceiling fans and ceiling light fixtures
- Wash the windows

Eat something pumpkin flavored

- Turn off exterior faucets
- Remove leaves around your outside HVAC unit

Bring out your warm clothes

- Store outdoor furniture and cushions
- Inspect chimney and roof for cracks and damage
- Cut back perennial plants and mulch around base

- Remove hoses from spigots and drain water
- Test snow blower and service if necessary
- Stow the lawn mower

Bake a dessert using apples

- Schedule a furnace tune-up
- Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors
- Check windows and doors for weather-tightness

- Clean out dryer vent
- Drain sediment from hot water heater
- Rotate/flip mattresses

Fill the house with fall-scented candles

- Wash bedskirts/covers/pads
- Wash curtains/blinds
- Begin to organize tax-related documents

Go for a walk in the fall colors

- Clean oven
- Wash shower curtains/liners

Carve a pumpkin

- Dust and scrub porch
- Clean out refrigerator

Drink apple cider

- Clean out entryway closet
- Tidy up and organize pantry and cabinets



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
